# **Course Description:**

Welcome to the Hebrew College online Hebrew course. In this semester (1B), you will review and strengthen the vocabulary and grammar that you acquired in the first semester, and will encounter knew vocabulary and language structures. You will also encounter additional aspects of Israeli culture, and will have opportunities to practice and improve your Hebrew proficiency.

The topic of this semester is the power that people have to change the world. Students will be introduced to the topic through a song by Arik Einstein and will then examine three ways in which individuals can change the world: volunteerism, innovation, and political acticvism.

# **Learning Objectives:**

# Vocabulary Development

Students will:

- 1) Review and strengthen knowledge and use of fundamental Hebrew vocabulary covered in previous semester.
- 2) Learn vocabulary related to the curriculum content.
- 3) Learn forms of the word "et" combined with personal pronouns.

# Grammar

Students will:

- 1) Review and strengthen grammar covered in the previous semester including agreement between nouns, verbs, and adjectives.
- 2) Learn to conjugate and use the past tense.
- 3) Learn to recognize the future tense.
- 4) Learn the purpose and use of the connecting word "et".
- 5) Learn words and prefixes introducing subordinate clauses.
- 6) Learn and use the construct form that connects two nouns in a possessive manner.

# <u>Israeli Culture</u>

# Students will:

- 1) Become familiar with songs by Arik Einstein and Boaz Sharabi.
- 2) Learn about the culture of volunteerism in Israel.
- 3) Learn about Israeli inventions that have changed the world
- 4) Learn about political activism in Israel.
