

He shall send away the live bird outside the city, into the open field. This is how he shall effect atonement for the house and it will be ritually pure. (Leviticus 14:53)

It seems to me there is no escaping from the work of praise. No ground outside its frame, no spare reply or costume of address. Send the live phrase

outside the city, out into the open field. Beyond the camp it spreads its wings, path an arrow's arc across the sky.

When has the earthbound thing grown smooth and whole and taken flight

This simple phrase on the sign offers much wisdom to all who enter, but especially to those of us interested in interfaith work.
