

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Interfaith Families Jewish Engagement: Critical Training for Today's Jewish Communal Professionals Often, clergy, educators, community leaders and outreach practitioners provide pastoral care and guidance as they teach, influence and work with couples and families of mixed faiths in a variety of ways. They use their training, resources, knowledge, intuition and past experiences to help make decisions and provide support as best they can. While they generally feel qualified to do so and confident in their abilities, at times they may lack some of the critical skills to be as effective as possible.

Hebrew College's online Interfaith Families Jewish Engagement (IFJE) program equips Jewish professionals for success with the interfaith couples and families they serve. IFJE participants are trained and prepared to engage interfaith families in scholarly and communal discussions about intermarriage and interfaith issues. The program provides the knowledge and innovative skills to support the growing population of interfaith families and engage them in Jewish life.

Current IFJE participants recognize the importance of interfaith training in order to be fully prepared for the work they face. Watch a video with them now.

Program candidates range from early career educators to experienced clergy, heads of school and community directors. In addition to the learning aspect of the program, IFJE participants build a network of colleagues, providing a base of support throughout their careers when challenging issues arise.

According to IFJE Program Director Dr. Keren McGinity, "IFJE graduates are prepared to be change agents for the future. They understand how people marrying into or out of Judaism feel. They grasp the complexity and embrace the nuances."

# The Future of Jewish Philanthropy: Six Prozdor Students Among Those to Award \$45,000 in Grants

On Thursday night, in a ceremony at Hebrew College, 49 high school students will be presenting seven grants totaling approximately \$45,000.

For the past year, these students have participated in the <u>Jewish Teen Foundation of Greater Boston</u> (JTFGB). The 49 students in JTFGB make up two separate boards, each meeting monthly — one at Hebrew College and one at Gann Academy. Of the 25 students meeting at Hebrew College, six are Prozdor students.

Students in the JTFGB run their foundation from the concept stage through the awarding of

grants. This year, the Hebrew College board selected domestic violence as its focus and will be awarding four grants — three to local organizations and one to a national organization — totaling just under \$25,000.

Prozdor student Sam Cantor recently blogged, "JTFGB encouraged me to stay involved in philanthropy through a Jewish lens as I continue to grow. The tools that this program has provided me with will enable me to become a prepared adult later in life with strong Jewish values rooted in tzedakah and tikkun olam." When discussing what he valued about the process throughout the year, he noted that, "I learned how to do all of this while surrounded by a group of Jewish teens who all feel as passionate about making an impact as I do."

The foundation hones teens' leadership skills, educates them about the needs of their communities and instills in them the habit of charitable giving. Although JTFGB approaches philanthropy through a "Jewish lens," the vast majority of the nonprofits that receive grants are not affiliated with any religion. The teens are awarding grants to four organizations providing services and support to victims of domestic violence as well as education about the issues surrounding it: <a href="Domestic Violence Ended (DOVE)">Domestic Violence Ended (DOVE)</a> in Quincy, MA; <a href="Jewish Family & Children's Service's TeenSafe">Jewish Family & Children's Service's TeenSafe</a> in Waltham, MA; <a href="The Second Step">The Second Step</a> in Newton, MA; and the <a href="National Coalition Against Domestic Violence">National Coalition Against Domestic Violence</a> in Denver, CO.

JTFGB is a program through <u>The Foundation Board Incubator of the Jewish Teen Funders Network</u>. The JTFN Foundation Board Incubator is generously funded by Laura Lauder and the Maimonides Fund.

# To Be a Guest in the World

Parshat Behar-Behuktai, Leviticus 25:1-27:34

The two Torah readings of Behar and Behukotai (paired in a joint reading this week) conclude the book of Leviticus. The first portion, Behar, begins with the laws of the sabbatical and jubilee years (every seventh year and fiftieth year respectively). Both of these special years construct an alternative relationship between the Israelites and ownership of land, agriculture, and human servitude. One verse in the middle of chapter 25

puts forward a profound claim about the status of the Jews living on the land given to them by God. "But the land must not be sold beyond reclaim, for the land is Mine; you are but strangers resident with Me" (Leviticus 25:23).
