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Graduating Cantors Take on Leadership Roles

<u>The School of Jewish Music</u> at Hebrew College will ordain three cantors on June 4. The new cantors, (pictured l-r) Beth Strassler, Julie Newman and Audrey Klein, will be taking on diverse leadership roles in Jewish communities across the country.

Beth Strassler will work at her hometown Congregation Etz Chaim in Biddeford, ME, where she has been a lay leader while studying at Hebrew College. Strassler is a second-career cantor who has commuted from Maine to Hebrew College for her graduate studies.

After ordination, **Julie Newman** will lead services at Chavurat Shirah, an independent minyan in her hometown of Pittsburgh. She will also be leading High Holiday services for the second time in Singapore with the United Hebrew Congregation. In addition, Newman works to engage adults in spiritual practices — such as contemplative prayer practices, Jewish mindfulness meditation, Shirah and Mussar Yoga, and chant —through a Jewish lens. Like Strassler, Newman is a second-career cantor, who commuted from Pittsburgh to Hebrew College for her five years of cantorate studies.

Audrey Klein will be working as an educator at independent Jewish communities throughout Toronto. This fall she will also be the High Holiday cantor at Farmington Valley Jewish Congregation-Emek Shalom in Simbury, CT.

"Our graduating cantorial students will be bringing creative and energetic practices, ideas and musical wisdom to their new positions in the Jewish world," says Cantor Lynn Torgove, MAJS'11, Can'12, Head of Vocal Arts at the School of Jewish Music. "We are looking forward to their continued teaching and music making as they grow into their roles. It will be a great honor to call our graduating students our newest cantorial colleagues!"

On the 50th Anniversary of Jerusalem's Reunification

I was just 5 years old when Jerusalem was reunified in 1967. I have no memories of the Six Day War, the great anxiety that gripped our people as the ravages of war unfolded or the euphoria that engulfed the Jewish world in its aftermath. I have a very hard time even imagining what it was like to live in a Jerusalem divided between Israel and Jordan or an old city of



Jerusalem that was inaccessible to Jews. Jerusalem - old and new, East and West, Israeli and Palestinian, Jew, Muslim and Christian - is one complex and holy city to me.
